In Jewish tradition, the days of Hanukkah are defined as *yemei hallel ve'hoda'ah* – days of praise and thanksgiving, instead of being a *chag* or *yamim tovim* (a holiday). These are days for reflection, days of awakening feelings of gratefulness for the miracles and acts of kindness God did for us back in the days of old, and those that occur nowadays as well, usually without us noticing them.

On Hanukkah we celebrate two miracles: the miracle of the impossible military victory, and the miracle of the long-lasting oil kindled in the Temple's menorah. And yet something is peculiar about celebrating both these miracles.

We thank God for the discovery of the sealed cruse of oil, sufficient only for one day's burning, which miraculously burned for eight days – long enough for the Kohanim to produce new oil. The Menorah was lit indoors, in the Temple's sanctuary, where the vast majority of Jews worldwide would never be able to see it. The only ones who would have seen it would have been the Kohanim who happened to be on duty that week.

Furthermore, lighting that Menorah was not a utilitarian commandment in any way. It wasn't a powerful floodlight, it was purely ritual. It was done because God commanded us to do so. If pure oil hadn't been found to light the Menorah and we had to wait until more could be produced, it wouldn't even have been considered a transgression at all, since Jewish law tells us that 'Ones Rachamana Patreh' – 'When circumstances beyond one's control prevent them from doing so, the Torah relieves them from guilt.' We could have waited a week to restart kindling the Menorah with no feelings of religious guilt. It would seem that God did this miracle solely for God's sake – because God wants the Menorah lit. Why, then, should we

be celebrating this miracle? Perhaps only God should celebrate it?

A similar observation might even be made regarding the military victory. In the Purim and Passover stories, the enemy actually wanted to kill us. In the Hanukkah story, though, they really only wanted us to stop being so outwardly Jewish, and to start acting more Greek. Would we not then be justified turning around to God and saying, "You want us to be Jewish so much, you find a way for us to do it without being killed"? Again, it seems this miracle was rather self-serving. Or, to put it another way: God owed us this miracle, since we were willing to risk our lives to continue being God's Chosen People.

Hanukkah tangentially teaches us two important lessons which apply both to our modern lives in general, as well as our personal relationships with Judaism. Firstly, that Judaism's observances are actually meant to benefit us, not just to benefit God. God asked us to perform them out of an understanding that it would make our lives better. "What has God asked of you? ...to walk in God's ways... letov lakh – for your own good." (Deuteronomy 10:12-13.) And secondly, that we should be grateful and appreciative even for

those things we feel we deserve.

When we gather in Shul and at home for our Hanukkah celebrations, let's try to reflect on this first point. Do we feel that we benefit from our Judaism, from our synagogue, from our rituals? Are our lives better because we include these aspects? I hope the answer is 'yes', but perhaps the answer is 'not enough'. And if that's the case, it may be time to rethink our relationship with Judaism and find ways to improve its relevance. I invite you to include me in that exploration, as I pride myself in being a rabbi who explores many different legitimate options for living Jewishly to tailor one's Jewish experience to their own life. So let's talk.

The second lesson is also an important one and speaks to the quality of our relationships with other people. We take so much for granted – especially in our interactions with other people. It is rarely harmful to show thanks and appreciation. Whether it's towards a family member, employee, neighbour, bus driver or the person serving you coffee, showing appreciation makes the quality of everyone's lives so much better – including the ones showing the appreciation themselves. Maybe that's the miracle of Hanukkah.

A word from **THE CANTOR**

Hallelujah - The Human Experience in Song

When you think of the song title, "Hallelujah", which melody and which text do you think of? Is it Louis Lewandowski's choral masterpiece of Psalm 150 from the 1800s? Is it the 1979 Israeli Eurovision winner by Milk & Honey? Do you think of no melodies at all but the original texts found in the Book of

Psalms? Or do you think of Leonard Cohen's 1984 folk-rock song, in English?

Cohen's composition is hauntingly beautiful. It's exquisitely melodic and highly intuitive. Its status as a classic song has only grown upon the recent and sad passing of the gifted and unique Cohen. He was a Montrealer. He was Jewish. His Jewishness was reflected in his work. His latest album includes the song, "You Want it Darker," featuring my friend and colleague, Cantor Gideon Zelermyer of Montreal's Shaar Hashomayim singing "Hineni" from the High Holidays. As such, his impact is felt keenly by us, members of a Canadian Jewish community.

Our people, our religion, our heritage is thousands of years old. This word, "Hallelujah", that has be-

come a word in many languages, is a Hebrew word. It originates in our holy texts, in the Book of Psalms. It is a refrain that was sung by the Levitical choir in our holy Temple in Jerusalem. Yet we think of a song, in English, written in 1984.

And what about the words? They include references to love and sex. The song contains lines like "Maybe there's a God above", "It doesn't matter which you heard, the holy or the broken Hallelujah". Most would say that this makes the song profane, not sacred. I disagree.

We seek to make the Bible, the Tanakh, relevant to us. We want to know how these ancient words can resonate in our lives in this day and age. In Leonard Cohen's "Hallelujah", many of us have found that bridge. The song is in our language.

It's also in a musical style that speaks to us today. And the text finds glory and holiness in the deepest of human connections - in love, in sex, in joy, in anguish. This is where Leonard Cohen strikes a chord within the heart and soul of North American Jewry, within us.

The Song of Songs teaches us that love, sex and the breadth of the human experience is sacred. Leonard Cohen's song reminds us of this and thereby captures a modern-day understanding of "Hallelujah"; he captures the modern-day human experience in song. It is up to us, not just our spiritual leaders, to continue to find modern and new ways to understand and relate to the sacred words of our holy texts. It is up to all of us to find holiness in our lives - to find our "Hallelujah".

My friends,

Before discussing objectives for the upcoming year, I'd like to start by thanking the 2016 Board of Directors for all their hard work over the past year. Not every meeting has run on time and the issues we've dealt with have sometimes been challenging. Without each of your contributions, we wouldn't be where we are today and for that I am grateful. This year has been marked by real financial challenges. For those of you who were not at the AGM, the auditors covered in detail some of the areas that were most challenging. Our financial statements are available for review through the shul office, should you want to view them for yourself. In this article, I will put a fine point on the issues facing

our Beth Jacob community. Last year, the Board needed to request an extension to our operating line of credit to meet all our needs. The bank will only extend that line on a temporary basis, so by year end we must return to below our previous limit of \$300,000. We are close, but not close enough. This will necessitate our reaching out to families with shul endowments and asking their permission to use those monies to reduce our line of credit to a level where we can manage it within our operation. We've done so much to reduce our operational footprint already and to all those who have offered their support to get us here, thank you! Unfortunately, more may be necessary.

This coming year, the Board will undertake an investigation to determine how else we might lease out additional space, allow other businesses to run inside our building or other alternate ways to improve our financial picture. This must be our top priority to ensure the future viability of our synagogue as dues revenues and new membership across communities in all North America continue to fall. Our second key focus this year will be engagement. While we've had an incredibly successful year with programming, offering a variety for everyone, we continue to lack engage-

ment from many groups within our community. While we have tried to represent our full demographic on the Board, there are those groups who go unrepresented. We must reach out to more people and offer suitable programming to you all and welcome you all into our home.

As was offered in the first bulletin article last year – we are here and we are listening. What we need is more feedback. I've received a fair bit of feedback suggesting people have things to say, but no one is saying them. For those of you waiting for a forum to discuss your suggestions or concerns, please don't wait. Write. For those of you looking for an audience, you have one. All you need to do is send your comments to me. I can be reached at miogus.bethjacob@gmail.com. Please don't hesitate to contact me as I truly want to hear from you. Each one of you can contribute to make our community stronger and better. We need your leadership to raise your concerns and suggestions, or opportunities that you may see in front of us. If there are none among us who are prepared to act, then we are effectively abdicating the responsibility of strengthening our community.

In preparing this article I came across an excellent opinion piece by Rabbi Jonathan Sacks in the

Jerusalem Post regarding leadership. I've excerpted one of his points here because I think it is most relevant to our community. I'd encourage you all to read the entire article!

“Compare the opening of Genesis with the opening of Exodus. The opening chapters of Genesis are about failures of responsibility. Confronted by God with their sin, Adam blames Eve, Eve blames the serpent. Cain says, “Am I my brother's keeper?” Even Noah, “righteous, perfect in his generations,” has no effect on his contemporaries. By contrast, at the beginning of Exodus Moses takes responsibility. When he sees an Egyptian beating an Israelite, he intervenes. When he sees two Israelites fighting, he intervenes. In Midian, when he sees shepherds abusing the daughters of Jethro, he intervenes.

Moses, an Israelite brought up as an Egyptian, could have avoided each of these confrontations, yet he did not. He is the supreme case of one who says: when I see wrong, if no one else is prepared to act, I will.

At the heart of Judaism are three beliefs about leadership: We are free. We are responsible. And together we can change the world.”

Let's each take the role of Moses. Let's all be prepared to act. Together we can truly change the world.

Syrian Refugee Newcomer Update

The Ramadan family arrived in Hamilton at the end of October. Although originally from Syria, the family fled in 2011 and had been living in Lebanon until their move to Canada. While in Lebanon the children did not have the opportunity to go to school.

Beth Jacob's group, The Syrian Newcomer Group – originally the Syrian Refugee Group – has been helping the family adjust to life in Canada. The Ramadan family also have the support of relatives who moved to Hamilton as Government Assisted Refugees approximately two years ago. In addition to various outings that included a trip to Niagara Falls,

several hikes, bowling, a visit to the farmer's market and library and recreation centre visits, our group has been helping the family to attend appointments with various service providers, find housing, obtain necessary documents and connect with resources.

The five children in the Ramadan family are 19, 17, 15, 13 and 10 years old. The three older children are currently attending school at Sir John A MacDonald and the younger two children will be starting school at Dr. Davey's this upcoming week. One of the biggest challenges initially related to securing long-term housing for the family. For the first couple of weeks the Rama-

dan family stayed with members of our community. They then moved to the Sisters of St. Joseph and stayed there for the remainder of November. On Dec. 1, the family took possession of the second floor of a house that is within walking distance to their relatives, both schools, the Immigrant Working Centre (where the parents will be attending school), Jackson Square, and the Downtown Mosque. Many of the items that were generously donated by members of our community have been brought to furnish the new house.

A couple of members of our community have committed to a long-term tutoring relationship with the family (to complement

the group tutoring they will be receiving at school). Learning English is a critical component of integration into our society. We are hopeful that in the near future we will be able to find Mohamad (the father) employment as a painter. Thank you to our community, to the donors and to the volunteers, who have enabled us to bring a refugee family to safety. We are proud of our community and our commitment to tikkun olam – healing and repairing the world. Our obligation to the family continues as we help the family to adjust to Canadian society and norms. Thank you for your ongoing generosity and support!

Hineini, “Here I am.”

At least a few times in the Torah, the statement is proclaimed. Remember when G-d called out to Moses at the burning bush? Moses' 'hineini' response sure guaranteed a considerable and life-long assignment. A few weeks ago, OOTC called out for some volunteer help. There were just enough who answered, “Hineini. Here I am,” but more like, “Behold! Here I am, doing this thing!” We love newcomers to our group! They are doe-eyed and eager. Please consider joining us. You can't imagine how much satisfaction you'll receive and all the 'good' you will be doing. There is still a need from 3:45 p.m. for an hour, or more, if you can stay.

Why the callout? The number of guests this season — 679 after five weeks, has risen by 45 per cent. When guests arrive at 4 p.m., they have been waiting outside, in line with little more than each other to stay warm. It would be a shanda to make them wait for someone to serve them some hot soup, bread and a smile.

Our costs are expected to rise too. We received very few non-perishable items from our annual Hamilton Food Share outing. However, we are drawing on Lococo's twice weekly haul of perfectly fine re-purposed vegetables and we never need to buy bread because Fortinos Main West provides it. Please, when you're shopping at either store, mention to their store owners how much their donations to OOTC mean to you. If you would like to organize a food drive like the Bentley condo residents do annually, we can provide a wish list of items.

As many of you remember, for many years, our OOTC commitment included a very meaningful shelter component. That ended in 2010 when enough women's beds were available for the need. Times have changed. Too many women are being turned away from the shelters and money to cover emergency beds isn't enough. Therefore, our OOTC Board has agreed to commit to fund ten additional beds at the YWCA which brings their total to sixty. This \$30,000 does not come from the Jewish community's Tuesday funds, but it does come from our collective mission to support the needs of the stranger, the widow, the fatherless and the poor.
