Rabbi Hillel Lavery-Yisraeli

At our community gathering in response to the terrorism currently happening in Israel, I noted that our High Holiday prayers mention that on Yom Kippur, God decides, “who will live and who will die ...” And I noted that the text also gives us a remedy: “Teshuvah, prayer and charity nullify the evil decree.” Though we live geographically far away, we cannot consider the problems in Israel as “someone else’s”. We Jews are all responsible for one another.

On a mystical, cosmic level, we definitely believe that our actions here affect the lives of our sisters and brothers in Israel and throughout the world. I am proud that our community is taking action on many fronts. We continue to say prayers for Israel regularly, and since the completion of the High Holidays, we as a community have engaged in a rigorous program of adult Torah education classes, offered nearly every day of the week, all with the ultimate goal of making us better human beings through exploration and consideration of the themes in our classical texts. In addition, we are embarking on a new charitable mission to sponsor a Syrian refugee family.

When Holocaust survivor Michael Mason spoke recently at Beth Jacob about his experiences during the war, I referenced a Mishna in Pirkei Avot that says, “Know from where you have come, and to where you are going...” I would suggest a slightly alternative, less fatalistic reading of the Mishnaic adage: “Know from where you came, so that it won’t be where you are going as well.” Part of our responsibility to remember the Holocaust is to make sure it doesn’t happen again – to us, or to others.

Antisemitism is on the rise throughout the world. I myself received six death threats from a Neo-Nazi/white-supremacist while living in modern, progressive Sweden. Genocides currently ongoing in many places in the world, like Syria, Nigeria, Sudan and Somalia are a stain on the entire world population. It is unacceptable that the world allows these things to occur. I am extremely proud to be part of a synagogue community that has began steps towards sponsoring a Syrian immigrant family, in fulfillment of my namesake Hillel the Elder’s dictum, “That which you despise, do not do to another person – this is the essence of the entire Torah, the rest is just commentary; go and learn.” (Talmud, Tractate Shabbat p. 31a).

In the darkest season of the year, we light candles to celebrate Chanukah. Chanukah refers to the rededication of the Temple, but the root of the word, Chanukah is Chinuch, meaning education, which we know is the key to change for the better.

It says in Proverbs (6:23): “For a mitzvah is a candle, and the Torah is light”. And it’s not just us – many other cultures and traditions use darkness as a symbol of ignorance, evil, and shameful behaviour, and light as a symbol of intelligence and righteousness. My hope is that both we and everyone else we share this planet with, continually incorporate more and more of the theme of Chanukah in our daily lives, studying and developing our sense of morality, equality and social justice with an eye to implementation and making this world a much safer place – if not for us, then for our children and grandchildren.

Chanukah Sameach!

We write this article with great respect for those who have worked so hard before us. In our time preparing for our term as co-presidents of the Beth Jacob Board of Governors, we have come to appreciate how much work, time, and effort goes into making Beth Jacob in Hamilton the best choice for our Jewish lives.

Cantor Eyal Bitton

I recently learned that God is a huge baseball fan. The Torah places such importance on the sport that the very first words in Genesis state: "IN THE BIG INNING"!

When I saw how excited the students of our Hebrew school were about the Blue Jays when they were oh so close to making it to the World Series, I decided to dedicate several classes on Jewish baseball -players over the years. The story of Jews in baseball, particularly in the early years,

has provided many learning moments. Through the example of the great Hank Greenberg and others, the students have begun to explore the history of antisemitism in North America. That a hotel in the south would openly state that Jews were not welcome is an outlandish concept to our open-minded young students. That fans and other baseball players would hurl racist insults at Jewish ball players - and to learn what those epithets were - has been a shocking reality for our students to learn about.

One of our students, Zev Leizer-Romalis, was profoundly confused by these stories. After all, he elaborated, isn't religion about people getting along? Aren't people supposed to accept others' diversity? Yes, Zev is right. But we all know that tolerance isn't embraced by everyone - and that's true throughout human history.

Chanukah, which is quickly approaching, commemorates a war against great religious intolerance. The Hellenists who took over Jerusalem, wanted Jews to integrate fully into their culture and their religion. Judaism, then, would no longer exist. The Maccabean revolt was a struggle to save Judaism. It was, to put it in today's terms, a struggle for acceptance and tolerance. This struggle is mirrored in the actions of these Jewish baseball players who sought to embrace the larger culture while preserving their Jewish identity. Our students have learned that Hank Greenberg and Sandy Koufax's excellence on the field has been as much a source of inspiration for Jews as has their refusal to play on Yom Kippur. In learning about pitcher "Subway Sam" Nahem, who lobbied for complete racial integration for African-Americans in the '30s and '40s, the students understand that tolerance is not just something we should seek for ourselves but for everyone.

The Jewish story is not about resisting the outside world. It's not baseball vs. the dreidl; it's baseball AND the dreidl.

Study with Rabbi Hillel (in the Richter Chapel)

Talmud - Mondays at 6:30 p.m.

Tractate Berakhot. We are studying the third chapter, dealing with how our regular prayers are adjusted when a close relative dies and with women's obligations to pray.

The Book of Daniel - Wednesdays at 6:30 p.m.

Daniel was, in some ways, the male version of Esther. Abducted as a child and taken to Babylon, he was castrated and fed a special royal diet with the goal of him becoming a special adviser to the idolatrous king Nebuchadnezzar. Against all odds, he remained true to God and our people until his very last day. Unique in the Tanakh, the book is almost completely written in Aramaic not Hebrew, making it more challenging to study. The tragic story is also said to contain hidden messages, including the date of the end of the world.

Introduction to Kabbalah - Thursdays at 9:00 a.m.

Begin to become acquainted with the complex concepts, ideas and systems of medieval Jewish mysticism. Is it authentic Judaism? We will study some texts both from the 'traditional' angle as well as a more scholarly/academic one, and see if and how it can relate to our modern lives.

Practical Judaism - Thursdays at 6:30 p.m.

A how-to crash-course in Judaism, from the very beginning. This course is appropriate both for newcomers to Judaism as well as experienced practitioners of our faith looking to gain a more accurate or sophisticated understanding of how we do what we do, and why. Open to people who are already Jewish, as well as to non-Jews seeking or considering conversion after private consultation with the rabbi.

Rashi on the Parasha - Shabbat mornings at 9:00 a.m.

Prepare yourself for the day's Torah reading by studying some of the comments of the primary classical commentator, Rabbi Shlomo Yitzchaki.

Study with Rabbi Yonah (in the library)

Jewish Laws & Customs: Work on Shabbat Thursdays at 6:30 p.m.

This course will examine the definition of "work" on Shabbat, always keeping in mind questions of social justice. As we learn about "work," we will ask ourselves what behaviours and relationships are promoted or avoided by prohibitions in Jewish law. Classical texts will be served alongside modern rabbinic commentary and the occasional Marx.

The concept of Tikkun Olam, the healing of our world, is central to Beth Jacob's values. These are not just words: Tikkun Olam is an ideal that we live and strive for.

While we all know about the Syrian refugee crisis that has affected millions of innocent civilians we don't always know what we can do. The Beth Jacob community is coming together to offer a tangible and gratifying way to respond: by sponsoring a Syrian family to come to Canada and by helping them to integrate into a new life of peace and opportunity.

We are delighted to inform you that we are sponsoring a Syrian refugee family of 7 individuals: a husband, wife, 3 sons (ages 17,13 and 12) and 2 daughters (ages 16 and 11). The wife's brother lives in Hamilton so this sponsorship will not only bring a Syrian refugee family to safety but will also reunify family members.

Two other organizations are helping us with this process:

JIAS (Jewish Immigrant Aid Society), an organization located in Toronto that is highly experienced in working with immigrants, and the IWC (Immigrants Working Centre), a local settlement agency that welcomes new Canadians and helps them integrate into their new city.

While we have already raised \$15,000, we need to raise at least \$15,000 more. We welcome any donations or fundraising assistance.

Note that donations are eligible for tax receipts.
